15.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

In line with NEP 2020, our institution embraces a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to education, focusing on the holistic development of students' intellectual, social, emotional, and moral capacities. A flexible curriculum enables creative combinations of disciplines, allowing Undergraduate (UG) students to choose from an MDC (Multidisciplinary Choice) pool, including subjects like Physics, Chemistry, Psychology, and Computer Science. For instance, UG Science students have explored Economics, while UG Arts and Commerce students have gained exposure to subjects like Physics and Chemistry, fostering versatility, adaptability, and a broader academic perspective. Additionally, our institution offers Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) in various subjects such as Mathematics, Physics, Computer Science etc catering to students of B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. These courses complement academic learning by nurturing critical thinking, enhancing problem-solving abilities, and developing analytical skills. By integrating diverse disciplines, this framework equips students with the flexibility, innovation, and holistic understanding needed to excel in a dynamic world. Nearly 1,000 students have benefitted from these initiatives, reflecting their widespread impact.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

As part of the transformative reforms introduced under the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, our college has successfully implemented the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system. This innovative digital repository empowers students by enabling them to securely store and seamlessly transfer the academic credits they earn while pursuing courses across different recognized institutions. Starting with the academic session of 2023-24, all undergraduate (UG) students have been mandatorily registered under the ABC system. This marks a significant step towards offering students greater flexibility and mobility in their educational journey, ensuring they can take advantage of diverse learning opportunities without the risk of losing previously earned credits. Nearly 2,000 students have been enrolled in this system, reflecting our commitment to aligning with NEP 2020's vision of a more holistic, student-centric, and flexible higher education framework. This initiative not only enhances the academic experience of our students but also positions our institution at the forefront of implementing progressive educational policies in India.

17.Skill development:

As part of our comprehensive preparation for implementing the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, our institution prioritizes skill development to enhance students' competencies and prepare them for a dynamic professional landscape. Below are the key components of our skill development initiatives: 1. Focus on Soft Skills We emphasize integrating soft skills into the curriculum to complement academic knowledge. Students are trained in communication, presentation, critical thinking, and adaptability, fostering wellrounded individuals prepared for modern workforce demands. By nurturing innovation and entrepreneurship, we aim to produce graduates who excel both academically and professionally. 2. Credit-Based Courses and Projects Our institution has implemented creditbased courses and project-based learning across all programs. These initiatives focus on community engagement, environmental education, and value-based learning. Value-Added Courses currently offered include: Ethical Hacking Creative Writing Banking & Financial Services Practical Taxation Green Chemistry We are also seeking state government approval to introduce additional courses, expanding opportunities for students to gain practical knowledge. 3. Promotion of Innovation and Entrepreneurship Our college has established

startups, incubation centres, and technology hubs to promote innovation and entrepreneurial skills. These platforms enable students to engage in technology-driven projects and cultivate business acumen. Our Institutional Innovation Council (IIC), established during the 2022-23 session under the Ministry of Education, actively promotes innovation, intellectual property rights, and entrepreneurial ventures. 5. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary Approach In line with NEP 2020, our institution offers a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach to education. Undergraduate (UG) students can choose from an MDC (Multidisciplinary Choice) pool, including subjects like Physics, Chemistry, Psychology, Computer Science, etc. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), in Mathematics, Physics etc, are also available to B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com students, providing a holistic academic experience. 6. Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) As required under NEP 2020, our college has implemented the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC), a digital repository enabling students to store and transfer credits earned across various institutions. All UG students starting from the 2023-24 session are registered under ABC, with nearly 2,000 students enrolled. 7. Skill Development Programs Our college offers a variety of Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Vocational Courses (VOC) to UG students, with options in subjects like Physics, Mathematics, Computer Science, etc. Additionally, we provide job-oriented certificate courses, both online and offline, in areas such as: Banking Taxation Creative Writing Green Chemistry Approximately 200 students are currently enrolled across these categories. Through the Institution Innovation Council (IIC), we organize activities to foster an entrepreneurial environment, including expert talks, workshops, and training sessions. These initiatives expose students to the skills required to establish successful businesses, ensuring they are well-prepared for entrepreneurial ventures. Conclusion Our institution's skill development initiatives are closely aligned with the transformative goals of NEP 2020. By integrating soft skills, credit-based learning, multidisciplinary approaches, specialized diploma programs, and platforms for innovation and entrepreneurship, we aim to produce graduates who are career-ready and capable of making meaningful contributions to society. These efforts reflect our commitment to holistic education and the empowerment of students for a dynamic future.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Our college administration is dedicated to promoting Indian languages, cultures, and traditions within our educational

framework. We offer courses in various Indian languages at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels; through such initiatives, we aim to preserve India's cultural heritage and promote linguistic diversity. In addition, the College Academic and Research Cell organized a one-week Faculty Development Program on the "Indian Knowledge System" in which more than 50 teachers participated and gained insights regarding IKS. Many of our teachers attended offline and online seminars, workshops, and FDPs on the Indian Knowledge System during the session. Such exposure further equips the teachers to understand their own cultural heritage and knowledge system in a better way and to be better prepared to impart the same in classrooms. The college administration ensures that significant festivals such as Lohri, Teej, Dipawali, etc., along with important days, are celebrated on the college campus to promote a sense of unity and fraternity amongst all.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is an educational approach focused on assessing and evaluating students' final learning outcomes upon course completion. This method emphasizes mastery of course material and its practical application in real-world contexts, thereby equipping students with the skills and knowledge needed for everyday life. Thus, the focus is on the outcome and its practicality, not just theoretical understanding of the subject. The key features of OBE are outlined below: 1. Clear Learning Outcomes Each course begins with clearly defined learning outcomes, specifying what students are expected to learn, experience, perform, and achieve by the end of the course. For example, in a Basic English Grammar course, students should be able to understand and apply grammar rules, identify and correct grammatical errors, use clear and accurate English in examinations and everyday communication. 2. Assessment of Learning Outcomes Students' learning is continuously evaluated through various methods, including class-tests, presentations, group -discussions, assignments, practical sessions, mid-term examinations, and university-level examinations. For instance, in the Fundamentals of Geographical Information Systems (GIS) course, students are assessed on their understanding of geographical maps and their proficiency in map-making and spatial analysis by the end of the course. The Environmental Studies students are supposed to seed and grow a plant as part of their practical work. 3. Student-Centered Approach OBE adopts a studentcentred model, emphasizing the development of critical and scientific thinking. It encourages students to actively investigate and inquire, fostering deeper understanding and expertise. For example, in the course Indian Political System, students engage with

the concept of parliamentary democracy through activities such as mock parliament sessions and simulations of the election process. In addition to this, Students of Mass Communication and Journalism publish fortnightly, hands-on training twice every month. 4. Focus on Competence and Skills OBE prioritizes the cultivation of competencies and skills among students. For example, in the course Entrepreneurship and Development, students are tasked with preparing a business proposal, demonstrating the skills and expertise they have developed during the course. Students are also given opportunities to showcase their skills through various start-up ideas during festivals and functions of HEI. 5. Flexibility and Adaptability While lesson plans are prepared at the beginning of a session, OBE allows teachers the flexibility to adopt innovative teaching methods and technologies to enhance the learning experience. For instance, students of literature may watch films based on novels and dramas to deepen their understanding of the texts and make their learning more engrossing and joyful. 6. Continuous Improvement OBE emphasizes the continuous improvement of both student performance and teaching practices. Feedback is collected from students, teachers, and parents at the end of each session. These suggestions are carefully evaluated and incorporated into future interactions of the course to ensure effective ongoing enhancements in learning outcomes and instruction. Mentorship classes are also held on a regular basis to map students' overall growth and to address their queries. The college also holds Parent-Teacher Meetings to make it a joint responsibility to monitor the growth and progress of students. 7. Instilling Confidence and Sense of Achievement OBE not only provides an opportunity for continuous evaluation of the learning competence and skill enhancement of students; it also instills confidence in them regarding their achievements. The consistent learning and evaluation process provides them a chance to aim realistically about their goals, adjusting the pace of their learning accordingly. Students are given opportunities to anchor stage programs, help manage large gatherings and maintain discipline, and in turn they get appreciation from their mentors along with experience and confidence of practical 8. Compulsory exposure to the practical part of learning The New Education Policy makes it mandatory for students to have practical exposure to their learning in real-life situations under the "Internship scheme". No program would be considered complete until the student undergoes this training and gets the evaluation and completion certificate from the employer. Under this scheme, the students learn how to implement their theoretical knowledge to practical use and self-evaluate their learning outcome. In conclusion, OBE represents a dynamic and student-focused educational framework that prioritizes clear learning objectives, skill

development, adaptability, and continuous improvement, ensuring that students are well-prepared for academic and real-world challenges.

20.Distance education/online education:

In response to the evolving educational landscape, our college has prioritized the development of online and distance education programs to ensure accessibility and flexibility for all students. Comprehensive training in online education has been provided by the Department of Higher Education, Haryana, to equip our faculty with the necessary skills. Faculty members now effectively utilise online platforms to deliver high-quality education, ensuring students receive an engaging and comprehensive learning experience. Recognizing the growing importance of digital infrastructure, the college is committed to expanding its resources to support online learning initiatives. As part of this effort, we introduced Distance Learning Programs through IGNOU starting from the 2022-23 session. These programs offer a wide range of disciplines, including: Bachelor of Arts Bachelor of Arts Hons. in Economics and English Master of Arts in History, English, and Hindi Master of Economics Bachelor of Commerce Master of Commerce Post Graduate Diploma in International Business Operations Diploma in Creative Writing This initiative has seen great success, with more than 300 students enrolled across these courses, demonstrating the increasing demand for flexible, accessible education. Through these distance learning opportunities, our college ensures students from diverse backgrounds can pursue higher education while balancing other commitments. Additionally, in line with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, students can now avail themselves of credits from online courses as part of their academic curriculum. This initiative encourages students to explore online learning platforms, allowing them to enhance their skills and earn academic credits that can be transferred toward their degree programs.

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

Practical sessions are carefully designed to promote experiential learning, allowing students to connect theoretical concepts with real-world applications. To further enrich their education, the institution organizes field trips, industrial visits, and excursions to locations like fish farms and nursery farms for hands-on exposure to industry practices. The Commerce department hosts events like "Commerce Fest," which simulates real-world marketing experiences and provides students with valuable insights into business operations. Regular lectures by industry experts facilitate interaction between students and professionals, broadening their understanding beyond traditional classroom learning. An innovative initiative by the Mass Communication department is the publication of a wall newspaper namedDastak, launched in September 2017. This project engages students in reporting, editing, and publishing under faculty guidance, promoting participatory learning. Additionally, various departmental competitions encourage peer learning. To support these educational activities such as tours, seminars, and workshops the institution allocates financial resources, ensuring a comprehensive and enriched learning environment that prepares students for future challenges in their respective fields.

Teachers use ICT (Information and Communication Technology) tools to make the teaching and learning process more effective. Almost all educators in the institution integrate educational technologies to enhance students' learning experiences. Faculty members are provided with necessary resources, including computers, high-speed internet, and access to electronic resources

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like e-books and e-journals, to create computer-assisted teaching materials. The campus is fully Wi-Fi-enabled with a 50 Mbps leased line and is equipped with 200 computers, 16 printers, 8 projectors, 7 scanners, 6 internet dongles, 6 laptops, and 8 smart classrooms. Additionally, there are 4 routers and 160 internet ports available across labs, lecture halls, and language labs. These tools proved invaluable during the pandemic when distance learning became essential. Classes were conducted on platforms like Google Meet, Cisco Webex, and Zoom, while study materials were shared via presentations, PDFs, and messaging apps like WhatsApp. To further support educators in utilizing online platforms effectively, the college and the Department of Higher Education organize training sessions and workshops. These initiatives ensure that teachers are skilled in using the latest econtent creation tools. The integration of ICT has revolutionized the learning environment by fostering seamless communication between teachers and students. The institution continuously adopts new ICT tools to enhance its academic offerings and maintain its position as a preferred destination for aspiring students.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college is situated in Ambala Cantt, conveniently close to the bus stand and railway station, ensuring affordable and easily accessible transportation for students. The campus features 45 classrooms, 8 laboratories, including 8 smart classrooms, and 200 computers distributed across departments to facilitate digitally-oriented teaching and learning.

Since 2018, the college has had access to e-content for various subjects, stored on an 8 TB hard disk provided by the Directorate of Higher Education, Haryana. Among the 8 labs, 4 are equipped with projectors, 2 have LAN facilities, and 1 features an LCD. Additionally, the college boasts an ICT-enabled Seminar Hall, a

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student home, a girls' common room, and an auditorium.

Sports facilities include courts for Handball, Basketball, and Volleyball, as well as a multipurpose hall for indoor games like Badminton and Chess. The campus is equipped with essential amenities such as parking, a canteen, drinking water coolers, first-aid services, CCTV cameras for security, fire safety measures, and separate washrooms for males and females.

The college library, managed using SOUL 2.0 software, includes a well-equipped stack room and a reading hall. Its extensive collection of books and resources is enhanced by subscriptions to N-LIST and the British Council.

For the holistic development of students, it is essential for educational institutions to integrate extracurricular activities alongside academics. The college provides adequate and regularly upgraded physical facilities to support a wide range of curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities.

The campus features a Student Home, an ICT-enabled Seminar Hall, and a well-equipped Auditorium, which serve as venues for various events such as Talent Hunt, Basant Utsav, student orientation programs, NSS camps, Youth Red Cross activities, Red Ribbon Club initiatives, seminars, and celebrations of national festivals like Independence Day and Republic Day. The institution also observes International Yoga Day annually.

Additionally, the Annual Athletic Meet is held every year to encourage student participation in sports. 4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

The Government PG College Library is one of the oldest government degree college libraries in Ambala, occupying an area of 1,500

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square feet. It houses a collection of over 27,500 books, including reference books, and subscribes to 4 journals, 7 newspapers, and 5 magazines. The library's collection spans a wide range of subjects, including English literature, pure sciences, commerce, history, social sciences, and languages.

The library is fully automated and equipped with integrated library management software, SOUL 2.0 (Software for University Libraries) by INFLIBNET. Books are organized using the Dewey Decimal Classification system, and an OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) service is available, allowing users to search the collection by title, author, publisher, and more. The books are barcoded, and users are provided with unique barcode IDs for easy access.

The library features a spacious reading hall and a reference section, both air-conditioned with four units, accommodating up to 60 users at a time. Beyond printed materials, the library provides access to e-resources such as N-LIST databases and the British Council collection, enabling users to browse and download e-books and e-journals. For enhanced security, the library is equipped with closed-circuit cameras.

The campus is equipped with a fiber optics-based leased LAN connection providing 50 Mbps speed, ensuring seamless internet access throughout the college. In addition, internet dongles are available for supplementary connectivity.

The college has 8 smart classrooms with internet connectivity and 8 well-equipped laboratories—4 with projectors, 2 with Wi-Fi-LAN facilities, and 1 with an LCD. An ICT-enabled Seminar Hall is also available for academic and co-curricular activities. Since 2018, the college has had access to e-content for various subjects, stored on an 8 TB hard disk provided by the Directorate of Higher Education, Haryana, and distributed to the respective departments.

Teachers benefit from access to e-resources like N-LIST and the

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British Council for enhanced teaching and learning. The library, fully automated since 2005, operates using SOUL 2.0 software. Administrative processes, including admissions, salaries, and scholarships, are computerized for efficiency.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The institutional policies emphasize the maintenance and enhancement of infrastructure through regular reviews conducted by the Principal, College Council, and Heads of Departments (HODs). This process facilitates efficient budget allocation and execution of plans based on grants and funds provided by the State Government and the Department of Higher Education.

An orientation program is organized annually for newly enrolled students to familiarize them with the available facilities and resources. Classrooms, smart classrooms, and laboratories are assigned to various programs according to the college timetable.

The college boasts a well-equipped staff room, a girls' common room, a student home, an ICT-enabled seminar hall, and sports facilities, including courts for badminton, volleyball, and kabaddi, as well as a multipurpose hall for indoor games.

The Public Works Department (PWD), Haryana, oversees all construction and major maintenance projects, while minor repairs are handled by the Building Committee. For new purchases, the Central Purchase Committee is responsible, and annual stock verification is conducted by a dedicated committee to ensure accurate property records. Items deemed unserviceable or unusable are identified by the Dilapidation Committee for repair or auction in compliance with government norms.

Laboratory instruments and equipment are recalibrated in-house,

and laboratories are upgraded using the Lab Augmentation Fund provided by the State Government. These systematic efforts ensure the infrastructure remains functional and supports both academic and extracurricular activities effectively.

Government PG College, Ambala Cantt works under the jurisdiction of the Director General Higher Education (DGHE), Haryana, which serves as the governing authority for all government colleges in the state. Academic regulations at the college are implemented in line with directives from the State Government and Kurukshetra University, the affiliating university.

The college is led by the Principal, supported by a team of associate professors, assistant professors, extension lecturers, and guest lecturers. Financial operations are managed by the Bursar, while public information matters are handled by the State Public Information Officer (SPIO) as per the RTI Act, 2005.

Ministerial staff includes the Deputy Superintendent, Assistant, and Clerk/Steno, ensuring efficient administrative functioning. For laboratory operations, Senior Lab Attendants, Junior Lab Attendants, and Lab Attendants provide necessary technical support. The library staff comprises Senior Librarians, Junior Librarians, Restorers, and Library Attendants, contributing to a well-managed library system. Additionally, supporting staff includes Mali, Peons, Chowkidars, and Security Guards (Class IV staff), ensuring the smooth day-to-day operations of the institution.

Regular teaching staff is appointed by the Principal Secretary of the Higher Education Department, Government of Haryana, based on recommendations from the Haryana Public Service Commission.

Similarly, regular ministerial staff is recruited by the state government following recommendations from the Staff Selection Commission, Haryana. This organizational structure ensures the effective administration and functioning of the college, fostering an environment conducive to academic excellence and holistic

The college effectively manages solid waste through a comprehensive segregation system. Biodegradable waste, such as plant litter, is collected and composted in designated pits, providing nutrient-rich manure for agricultural purposes. Non-biodegradable waste is collected separately and transported away by Municipal Committee vehicles. Additionally, liquid waste is channeled into the Municipal Committee's sewerage system, ensuring adherence to local sanitation regulations.

When it comes to electronic waste, the college follows the Haryana Government's policies for e-waste management. A central store, located at ERDC, Ambala Cantt, is maintained by HARTRON for the disposal of old or condemned electronic items. The disposal process occurs quarterly, either through press tenders or through empanelled vendors. HARTRON oversees the sale of e-waste, retaining its depreciated value as determined by the Technical Committee. Moreover, each district within the region has a common store managed by the District IT Society, under the supervision of the Deputy Commissioner. These district stores handle the quarterly disposal of outdated electronic items. If bids for the reserve price are not achieved, functional items may be donated to recognized state or central government service organizations. Certificates are provided for such donations, ensuring proper tracking and accountability.

Additionally, these learners are motivated to pursue further education and utilize resources such as e-libraries, journals, and reference materials available in the college library. Activities such as group discussions, student-led seminars, project work, case studies, presentations, assignments, quizzes, debates, and laboratory experiments are integral to the curriculum. These diverse methods not only foster critical thinking but also encourage collaboration among students. Practical sessions are carefully designed to promote experiential learning, allowing students to connect theoretical concepts with real-world applications. To further enrich their education, the institution organizes field trips, industrial visits, and excursions to locations like fish farms and nursery farms for hands-on exposure to industry

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practices. The Commerce department hosts events like "Commerce Fest," which simulates real-world marketing experiences and provides students with valuable insights into business operations. Regular lectures by industry experts facilitate interaction between students and professionals, broadening their understanding beyond traditional classroom learning. An innovative initiative by the Mass Communication department is the publication of a wall newspaper namedDastak, launched in September 2017. This project engages students in reporting, editing, and publishing under faculty guidance, promoting participatory learning. Additionally, various departmental competitions encourage peer learning. To support these educational activities such as tours, seminars, and workshops the institution allocates financial resources, ensuring a comprehensive and enriched learning environment that prepares students for future challenges in their respective fields.

Teachers use ICT (Information and Communication Technology) tools to make the teaching and learning process more effective. Almost all educators in the institution integrate educational technologies to enhance students' learning experiences. Faculty members are provided with necessary resources, including computers, high-speed internet, and access to electronic resources like e-books and e-journals, to create computerassisted teaching materials. The campus is fully Wi-Fi-enabled with a 50 Mbps leased line and is equipped with 200 computers, 16 printers, 8 projectors, 7 scanners, 6 internet dongles, 6 laptops, and 8 smart classrooms. Additionally, there are 4 routers and 160 internet ports available across labs, lecture halls, and language labs. These tools proved invaluable during the pandemic when distance learning became essential. Classes were conducted on platforms like Google Meet, Cisco Webex, and Zoom, while study materials were shared via presentations, PDFs, and messaging apps like WhatsApp. To further support educators in utilizing online platforms effectively, the college and the Department of Higher Education organize

training sessions and workshops. These initiatives ensure that teachers are skilled in using the latest e-content creation tools. The integration of ICT has revolutionized the learning environment by fostering seamless communication between teachers and students. The institution continuously adopts new ICT tools to enhance its academic offerings and maintain its position as a preferred destination for aspiring students.

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The internal assessment process at the institution is both transparent and effective, ensuring regular evaluation of student performance. Aligned with the guidelines from Kurukshetra University, this system serves as a key method for assessing both students and teaching practices. The internal assessment includes class assessments, assignments, and attendance records, creating a comprehensive evaluation framework. Students are assigned specific topics in their subjects and are required to submit two handwritten assignments, which are then graded by their instructors. Teachers provide ongoing feedback on classroom performance, and any issues related to attendance are communicated promptly to ensure students meet lecture requirements. The results of internal assessments are made publicly available on classroom notice boards, and instructors discuss them with students during classes. If students have concerns about their assessments, they are encouraged to speak directly with their teachers. Starting from the academic session 2023-24, the college has implemented the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 in accordance with the guidelines set by Kurukshetra University for the students of first year. Under this new policy, mid-term examinations are conducted, and the marks obtained by students are communicated to them. These marks contribute to their overall internal assessment as specified by the university's regulations. This internal assessment mechanism promotes transparency and strengthens the relationship between faculty and students, contributing to a supportive learning environment.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The college is situated in Ambala Cantt, conveniently close to the bus stand and railway station, ensuring affordable and easily accessible transportation for students. The campus

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features 45 classrooms, 8 laboratories, including 8 smart classrooms, and 200 computers distributed across departments to facilitate digitally-oriented teaching and learning.

Since 2018, the college has had access to e-content for various subjects, stored on an 8 TB hard disk provided by the Directorate of Higher Education, Haryana. Among the 8 labs, 4 are equipped with projectors, 2 have LAN facilities, and 1 features an LCD. Additionally, the college boasts an ICT-enabled Seminar Hall, a student home, a girls' common room, and an auditorium.

Sports facilities include courts for Handball, Basketball, and Volleyball, as well as a multipurpose hall for indoor games like Badminton and Chess. The campus is equipped with essential amenities such as parking, a canteen, drinking water coolers, first-aid services, CCTV cameras for security, fire safety measures, and separate washrooms for males and females.

The college library, managed using SOUL 2.0 software, includes a well-equipped stack room and a reading hall. Its extensive collection of books and resources is enhanced by subscriptions to N-LIST and the British Council.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1 - Library is automated using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS)

The Government PG College Library is one of the oldest government degree college libraries in Ambala, occupying an area of 1,500 square feet. It houses a collection of over 27,500 books, including reference books, and subscribes to 4 journals, 7 newspapers, and 5 magazines. The library's collection spans a wide range of subjects, including English literature, pure sciences, commerce, history, social sciences, and languages.

The library is fully automated and equipped with integrated library management software, SOUL 2.0 (Software for University Libraries) by INFLIBNET. Books are organized using the Dewey Decimal Classification system, and an OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue) service is available, allowing users to search the collection by title, author, publisher, and more. The books are barcoded, and users are provided with unique barcode IDs for easy access.

The library features a spacious reading hall and a reference section, both air-conditioned with four units, accommodating up to 60 users at a time. Beyond printed materials, the library provides access to e-resources such as N-LIST databases and the British Council collection, enabling users to browse and download e-books and e-journals. For enhanced security, the library is equipped with closed-circuit cameras.

The IT facilities of the college are regularly upgraded to meet modern technological demands. The campus is equipped with a fiber optics-based leased LAN connection providing 50 Mbps speed, ensuring seamless internet access throughout the college. In addition, internet dongles are available for supplementary connectivity.

The college has 8 smart classrooms with internet connectivity and 8 well-equipped laboratories—4 with projectors, 2 with Wi-Fi-LAN facilities, and 1 with an LCD. An ICT-enabled Seminar Hall is also available for academic and co-curricular activities. Since 2018, the college has had access to e-content for various subjects, stored on an 8 TB hard disk provided by the Directorate of Higher Education, Haryana, and distributed to the respective departments.

Teachers benefit from access to e-resources like N-LIST and the British Council for enhanced teaching and learning. The library, fully automated since 2005, operates using SOUL 2.0 software. Administrative processes, including admissions, salaries, and scholarships, are computerized for efficiency.

4.4.2 - There are established systems and procedures for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc.

The institutional policies emphasize the maintenance and enhancement of infrastructure through regular reviews conducted by the Principal, College Council, and Heads of Departments (HODs). This process facilitates efficient budget allocation and execution of plans based on grants and funds provided by the State Government and the Department of Higher Education.

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An orientation program is organized annually for newly enrolled students to familiarize them with the available facilities and resources. Classrooms, smart classrooms, and laboratories are assigned to various programs according to the college timetable.

The college boasts a well-equipped staff room, a girls' common room, a student home, an ICT-enabled seminar hall, and sports facilities, including courts for badminton, volleyball, and kabaddi, as well as a multipurpose hall for indoor games.

The Public Works Department (PWD), Haryana, oversees all construction and major maintenance projects, while minor repairs are handled by the Building Committee. For new purchases, the Central Purchase Committee is responsible, and annual stock verification is conducted by a dedicated committee to ensure accurate property records. Items deemed unserviceable or unusable are identified by the Dilapidation Committee for repair or auction in compliance with government norms.

Laboratory instruments and equipment are recalibrated in-house, and laboratories are upgraded using the Lab Augmentation Fund provided by the State Government. These systematic efforts ensure the infrastructure remains functional and supports both academic and extracurricular activities effectively.

The college effectively manages solid waste through a comprehensive segregation system. Biodegradable waste, such as

plant litter, is collected and composted in designated pits, providing nutrient-rich manure for agricultural purposes. Non-biodegradable waste is collected separately and transported away by Municipal Committee vehicles. Additionally, liquid waste is channeled into the Municipal Committee's sewerage system, ensuring adherence to local sanitation regulations.

When it comes to electronic waste, the college follows the Haryana Government's policies for e-waste management. A central store, located at ERDC, Ambala Cantt, is maintained by HARTRON for the disposal of old or condemned electronic items. The disposal process occurs quarterly, either through press tenders or through empanelled vendors. HARTRON oversees the sale of e-waste, retaining its depreciated value as determined by the Technical Committee. Moreover, each district within the region has a common store managed by the District IT Society, under the supervision of the Deputy Commissioner. These district stores handle the quarterly disposal of outdated electronic items. If bids for the reserve price are not achieved, functional items may be donated to recognized state or central government service organizations. Certificates are provided for such donations, ensuring proper tracking and accountability.
